ACLS Humanities E-Book (HEB) now includes over 1700 full-text, cross-searchable books in the humanities selected by scholars for their continuing importance to teaching and research. The project includes primarily in-print books, with about 15% out-of print. It will add 500 titles this summer and every year going forward.

HEB is a collaboration of the American Council of Learned Societies, various constituent members of the ACLS and nearly 95 publishers.

Areas include: Comparative/World Studies, Africa, America, Asia, Latin America, Europe, the Middle East, Byzantium and the Mediterranean, and Australasia/Oceania, plus Women's Studies, Native Peoples of the Americas, and the history of Economics, Science and Technology, Archaeology, Art History, Folklore, Religion, Musicology, Literature, and Political Science.
