

WHEREAS Newburgh citizens are now paying for the cost of this program and are not sharing in its benefits, and



Lake Streets Merchant Hits Street Mall Idea

NEWBURGH - The City of Newburgh is going to make Ripley's "Believe It or Not" for a third time when it builds a "two-block long, four-lane superhighway with a 'Berlintype wall' for a mall," a city merchant said today.

Joseph Costa referred to the Urban Renewal Agency's Lake Street project.

Costa, who has asked for a cut in the mall, if one is built, said at his business, Costa Beverages, Lake Street, that the project is a "superhighway that goes from nowhere to nowhere."

The city has twice been

included in Ripley's "Believe It or Not," Costa said -when a train once ran through Schoon-

maker's Department Store, and when the main entrance to the former Caldwell Lawnmower Building was built on the sixth floor.

Costa, who has charged that no official determination has been made that the mall is necessary in the first place, said today that his personal opinion is that the mall is the idea of Jack Present, director of the Newburgh Urban Renewal Agency.

"It looks like Present is trying to build a monument to himself, at taxpayers' ex-

pense," said Costa.

"Urban Renewal has demolished all the building and businesses on the west side of the wall," Costa said. "And now they are preventing the businesses remaining from doing business and getting local taxpayers to pay for it."







We have run into a very serious problem on the Key Bank site concerning debris and garbage that were left buried their during the urban renewal take down of property.

Because this debris was not cleared and refilled in the proper way, we have had to dig further down to reach appropriate footings and also remove the non-disposable material. The contractor has been trying to squeeze us for his costs and we have been fighting with him on a settlement for a certain dollar amount. There is some room for us to agree on but what I have asked Robert Lamb Hart to do is to see if he can redesign the footings so as to reduce the cost.

I have had numerous meetings with Turner and Bill Hauser and have now brought the architect into the meetings to try to resolve this matter. The cost has become so exorbitant that he was almost forced to stop the job so that we do not incur additional costs that we did not have in the budget.

After our meeting on Monday with the above principals involved I do feel there is room to negotiate with J&L and also the possibility of a redesign to minimize costs.

I will keep you abreast of this situation as we have more meetings scheduled with the architect and Turner. A copy of a letter from Robert Lamb Hart is attached because I did raise the issue as to why this had not been discovered in our test borings and I believe they have answered that question quite adequately.






